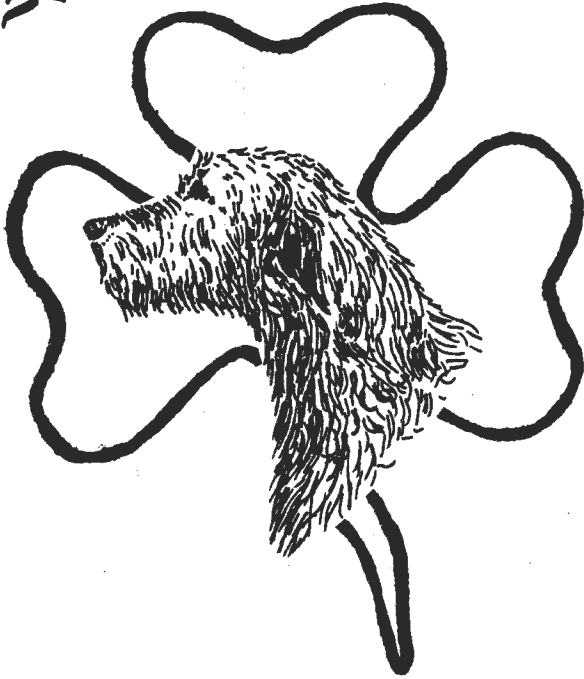
I suppose we might thank the "weather man" as well, for the day was an excellent one, not too cold and not too hot. The dogs, as well as the people, enjoyed the outing.

ROVING WITH ROVER

If you're planning to take Rover along on the family vacation by car this year, a few pointers may prove of help. Suggests the Alameda County (Calif.) Veterinary Medical Association:

Your dog should wear two collars while traveling; one light chain-choke collar and one leather collar. Put your local dog license on one collar, and identification on the other. Even if Rover loses one collar, he can still be identified. Be sure, too, to attach his rabies tag on his collar, as a precaution.

A six-foot leash is desirable. Shorter ones may be jerked out of your hand, and you aren't able to grab the short end if the dog bounds off to meet another dog. The added two feet is a great safety factor.

It's also a good idea to take along a 20-foot piece of strong, lightweight cord with a harness snap on one end and a loop on the other. Attach to the dog's collar before he's taken out of the car for exercise or to relieve himself. He

can sniff around at a distance from you but still be under absolute control. NEVER turn your dog loose in strange surroundings. The danger of being hit by a car or getting lost is too great.

Rover will feel less nervous, too, if you take along his familiar sleeping pad, or a square of old blanket, for his use in the car and at whatever place you stay for the night.

And don't forget flea powder. Rover may have started out immaculate but he could pick up a flea or two along the way. You don't want the fleas in your car and the hotel or motel or your vacation hosts don't want them either. Neither, of course, does Rover.

Lots of dogs apparently enjoy hanging out the window, letting the wind whip at their heads. But don't permit your dog to do this. Bits of grit may be driven into his eyes, and in any case, he may get nasal and eye passage inflammation just from the wind. Make your dog keep his place in the car, or close the window most of the way.

NASAL PYODERMA OR HERE WE GO AGAIN

Once again, I find myself plowing through my veterinary medicine books in an effort to understand what rare disease Cormac has picked up this time (or even invented, which I would not put past him, since he likes the vet's receptionist).

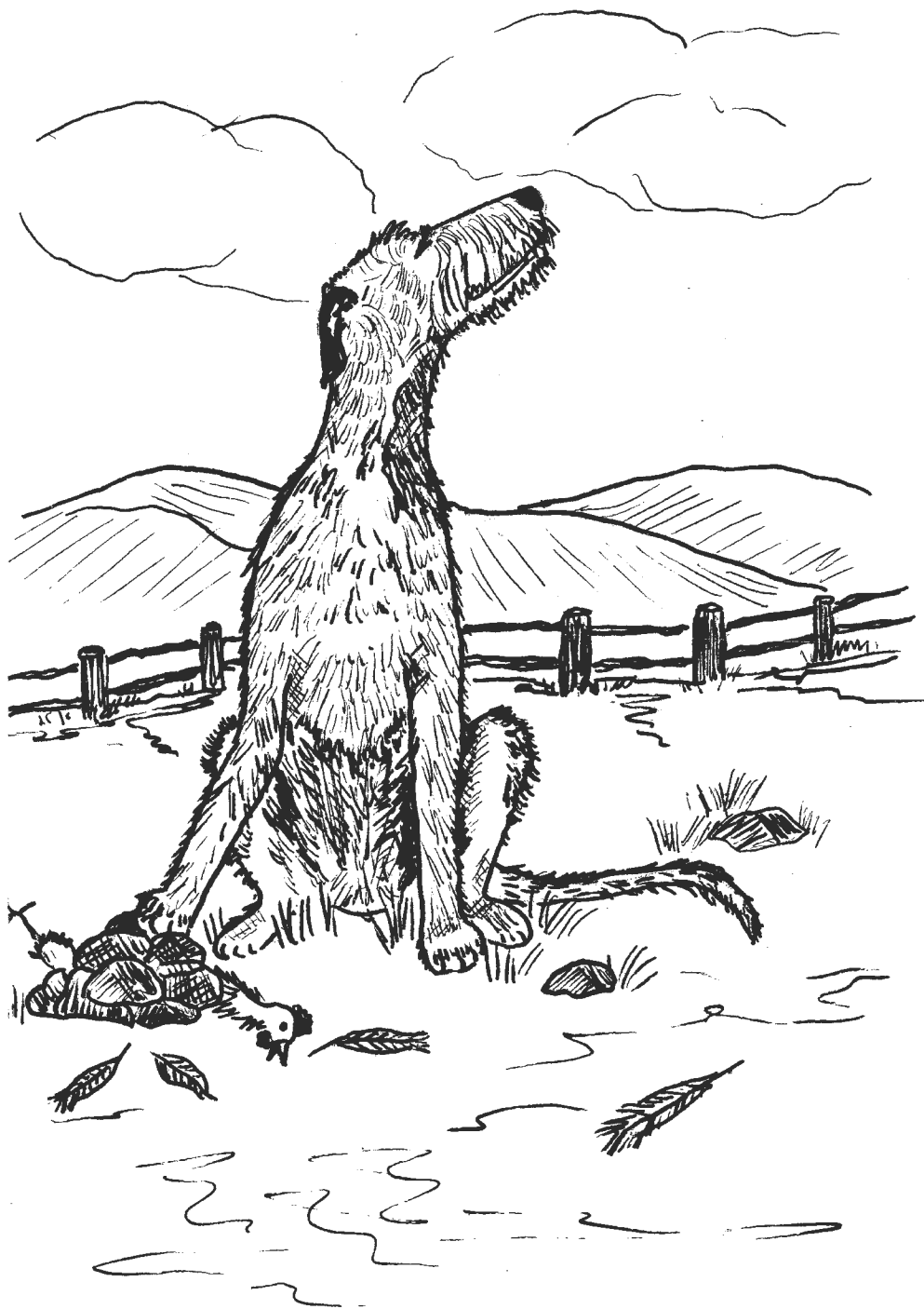
This latest episode involved another skin condition; this time, an infection localized to the bridge of his nose which accounts for its name: Nasal Pyoderma. This disease is characterized by its rapid onset, reddish swellings, and pustule formations. With proper treatment, it generally lasts no more than one to three weeks. There is a danger of scarring, however, if improperly treated.

As stated earlier, this is a bacterial infection; as such, if the pustules are rubbed -- as in an attempt to clean them or apply a topical ointment -- they can be broken and the infection spread to cover the entire nose with resultant scarring. In severe cases, the entire head may be involved.

The best treatment is with systemic antibiotics which will control and cure the infection rapidly. Wet dressings with hexachlorophene (Phisohex) and warm water may be used, but with caution due to the danger of spreading the infection and causing scarring.

The organism which causes nasal pyoderma is a normal inhabitant of the skin and it is not yet known what causes it to suddenly reproduce so rapidly with resultant pustule formation. The cure, however, is equally rapid and thorough if instituted without delay.

OBEDIENCE EXERCISES REQUIRED FOR C.D.

(Recall: Continued from June Issue of Bugle)

After the dog has come to the handler and sits in front of him, the judge will order the handler to give the command or signal to Finish and the dog must go to the Heel Position and sit. A dog must receive a score of zero for any of the following: not staying without additional command; failure to come on the first command; moving from the place where left before being called; not sitting close enough in front. Substantial deductions are made for slow response to come; minor deductions for slow or poor sits or finishes and for touching the handler on coming in, or while finishing.

The Long Sit and Long Down are exercises done in group situations. All competing dogs in the class take these exercises together in groups of 12, more or less.

For the Long Sit, the handlers, on order from the judge, command their dogs to "Sit". On further order from the judge to leave their dogs, the handlers give a command to "Stay", and immediately go to the opposite side of the ring, turn and stand facing their respective dogs. After one minute from the time he has ordered the handlers to leave their dogs, the judge will give the order to return, whereupon the handler must walk back to the dog, around him and into heel position. The dogs must not move from the sitting position until after the judge has given the order "Exercise Finished".

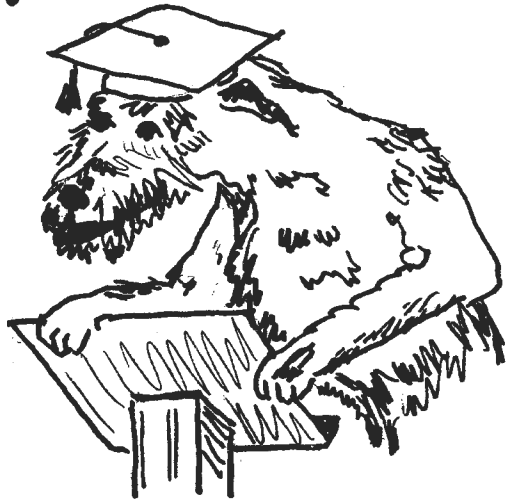
For the Long Down, essentially the same procedure is used, except that the dogs must remain in the down position for three minutes and not move until after the judge has said "Exercise Finished".

And so, here endeth the layman's description of the exercises required for C.D. OPEN and UTILITY may follow at a future date.

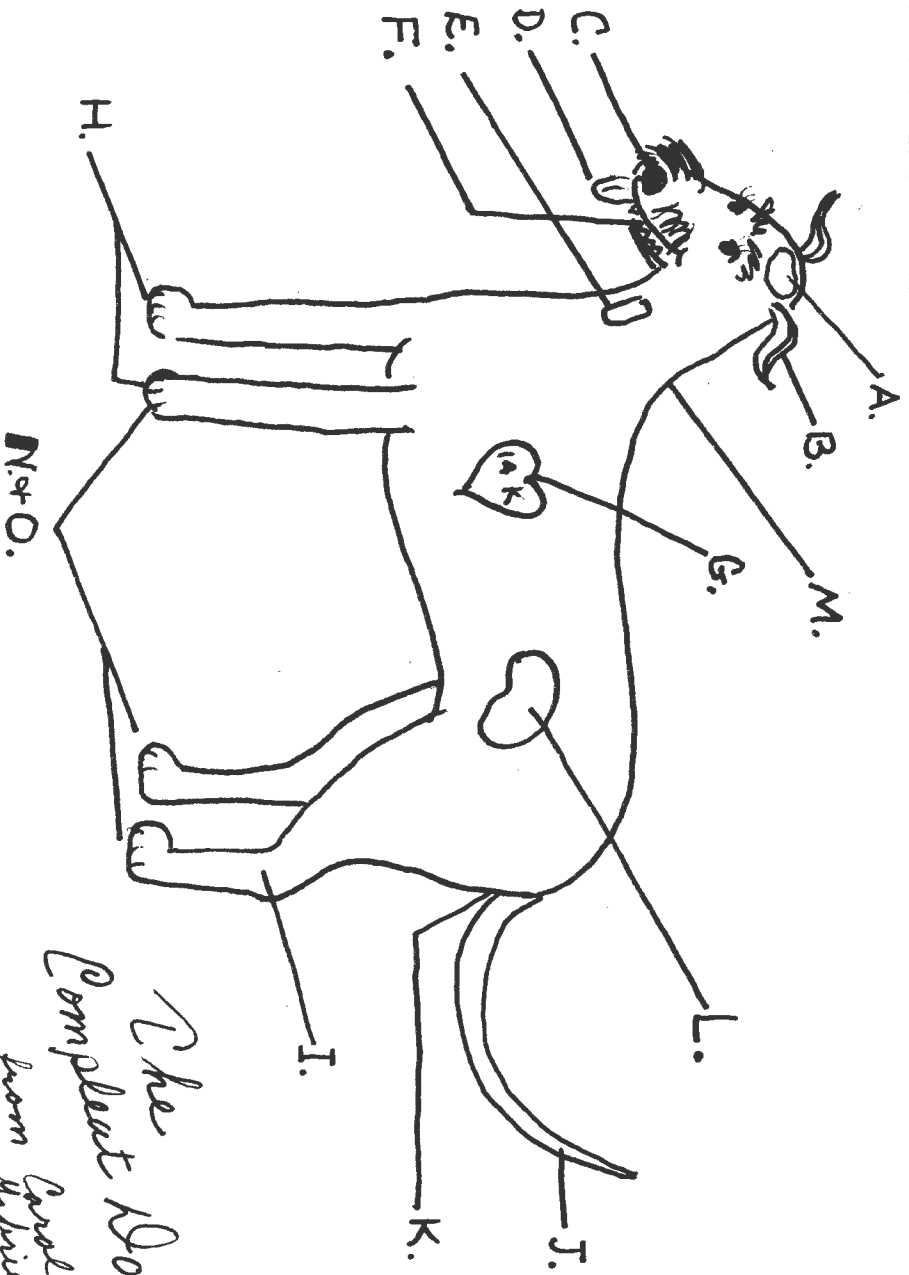

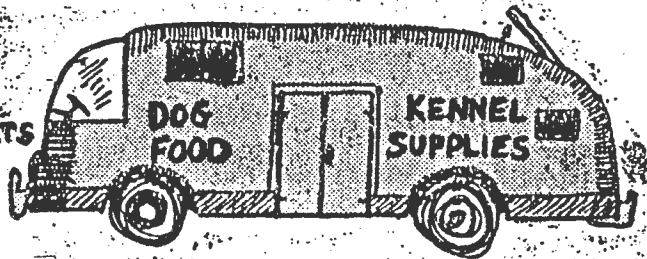

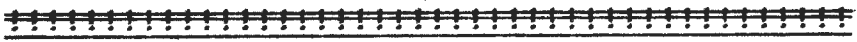

NOFCA RULE CHANGES

The National Open Field Coursing Association held its annual convention in Merced, California on July 12, 1975. NCIWC delegates Ann Sweeney and Bruce Cromer were present.

The purpose of the meeting was to vote on rule changes presented in May and to vote for a board of directors and officers.

Some 15 proposed rule changes were voted on. Those passed of special interest to IW owners were:

2(a). The number of points deducted for a pre-slip shall be determined by the judge.

2(b). In the event a course is declared a no-course due to a pre-slip, the judge may deduct points from the score of the pre-slipped hound in the re-run of the course. (It was felt that pre-slipping is a serious problem. These two changes would discourage pre-slips by allowing much tougher penalties.)

3. Eliminate all references to time limits in regard to running the hounds. (In the event of a very short course, this allows the judge to decide if he has seen enough to score the dogs.)

10. A take is not required of Irish Wolfhounds to obtain an ACM. It shall be retroactive to July 23, 1972 (date the NOFCA originated). (This is the big change for IW people. Now a Wolfhound can get recognized for coursing ability even though not bred for the taking of small game. The ACM, award of coursing merit, requires earning 100 points in breed competition. At present only two bitches have met the requirement: Ch. Canyon Creek Sorcha, owned by Ann Sweeney, and Viva's Pegeen O'Toole of Pern, owned by Kelly and Bruce Cromer. A similar rule change was proposed for Afghans and Deerhounds. Some Afghan people indicated that they did not desire the change for their breed. The change passed for Deerhounds, failed for Afghans.)

13. Revision of the rules of brace elimination coursing on a trial bases. (This permits a third method of running a hunt.)

15. Switch positions of pink and yellow blanketed hounds when hunting. (This was approved after statistics were presented which

indicated that the inside dog (yellow blanket) seemed to almost always score more poorly than the other two hunt dogs. By switching two colors, hopefully it can be determined whether either blanket color or center position caused the uneven results.)

Ann Sweeney was chosen as a member of the Board of Directors, a well-deserved honor. A special thanks from all Wolfhounds should go to Ann for her persistent advocacy on behalf of IW's in open field coursing.

The 1975-76 season's first Irish Wolfhound breed hunt will be held on November 15, 1975. A complete open field coursing calendar will be in the next Bugle.

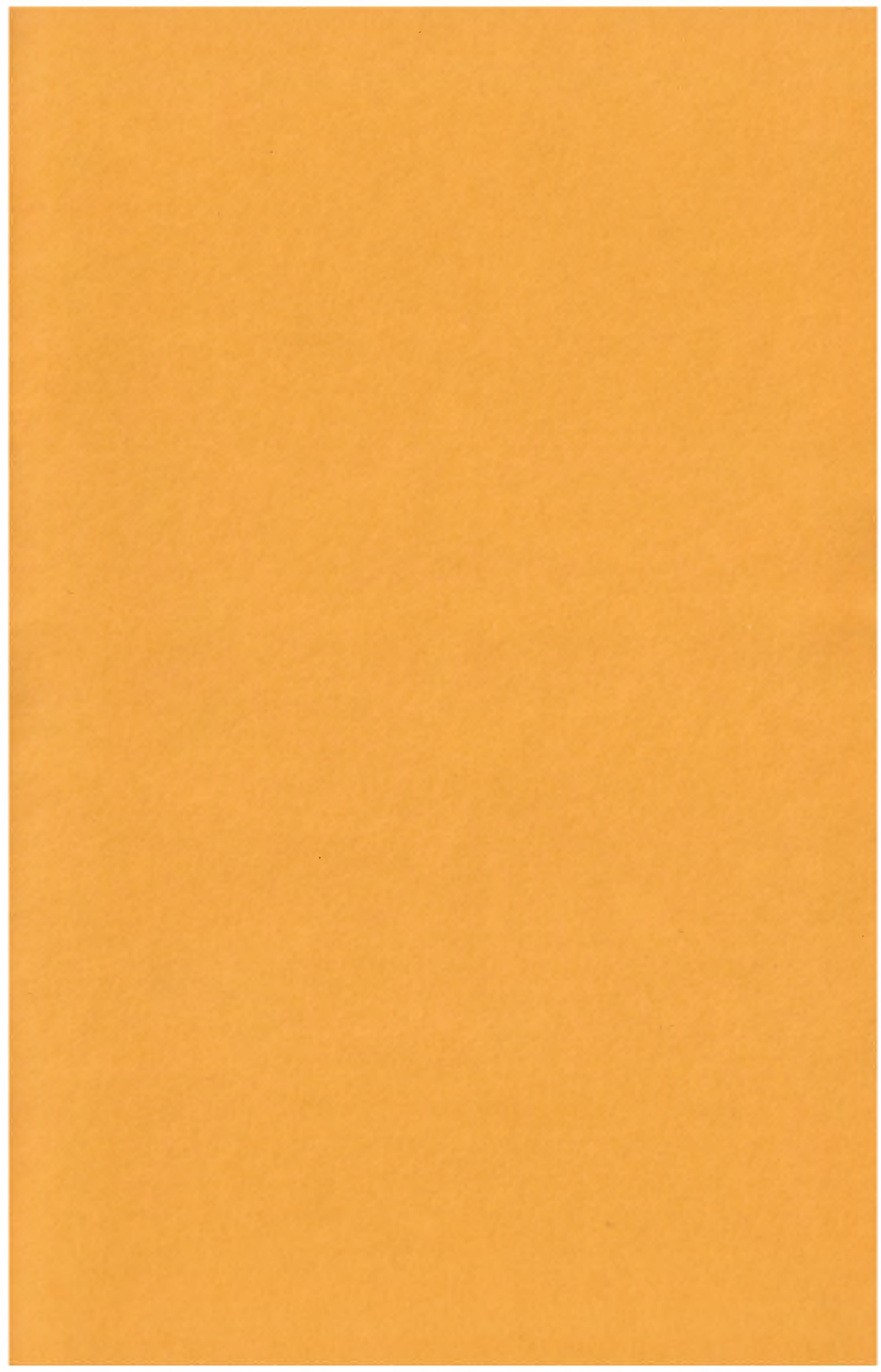
